Solving a Linear Equation with Several Occurrences of the Variable: Problem Type 5

• Example 1

Solve $2(3x - 1) - 3(x + 5) = 4$.

$$2(3x - 1) - 3(x + 5) = 4$$

$$6x - 2 - 3x - 15 = 4$$

$$3x - 17 = 4$$

$$3x = 21$$

$$x = 7$$

The solution is 7.

To check, return to the original equation to replace x with 7.

$$2(3 \cdot 7 - 1) - 3(7 + 5) = 4$$

This gives

$$4 = 4.$$

The solution is verified.
